Grace and Peace to you all from Christ our Lord,

Like many of you I have watched the events of the world we live in and reflected on all the pain that seems to surround us. I have looked at pain from conflicts like what we see in the Middle East, pain from natural disasters and random catastrophes and wondered "why?"

The problem of pain was the subject of a number of the great Christian apologist C.S. Lewis' works. Lewis, who came to the faith later in life, had struggled with the age-old question of "why does a good God allow bad things to happen" before he came to the faith. His good friend and fellow college professor (and initials in place of name enthusiast) J.R.R. Tolkien spent many evenings sitting in a pub with the good Dr. Lewis trying to work through the theological ramifications of pain, or in other words, "why does God do, or not do, what God does...or not". The subset of theology that deals with this is called "Theodicy". Lewis could come to grips with the pain that was caused by human faults and sin. Lewis, who was an Irishman from Belfast, had served in the British army during World War One and as such, he had a keen understanding of the damage humans can do to one another. He understood that human born evil broke bodies, ruined families, and destroyed nations. He had seen it firsthand in the trenches of the Somme Valley in France. What he could not wrap his mind around as a young man was the pain we as humans suffer from for no reason but dumb luck.

Watching the footage of the floods in North Carolina, the hurricane damage in Florida, and the devastation in parts of the nation after a particularly bad wildfire season, one might think the very planet itself is out to get us. What do we say when we see the pain of our neighbors and have to address the question of where is God in all of this? Jesus himself addresses this question in the 13th Chapter of Luke when he points to a clear human caused tragedy where The Roman Governor Pilate had executed a group of Jews while they were at worship, then he points to a group of construction workers killed in a building collapse as they were building a tower. He makes it clear that neither the human tragedy of Roman oppression nor the natural disaster of the collapsed building was better or worse than the other. Pain was pain and suffering was suffering. Then in the 5th vs he says this about those who died in the natural disaster: "No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all likewise perish". Read out of context this seems like a harsh thing to say.

The conclusion that CS Lewis came to the one that facilitated his conversion to Christianity...is that God uses human suffering to redirect the hearts of the people. That is to say God uses pain like a roadmap that points us back to our need for him. When Jesus says "repent" this isn't an angry accusation, it is the voice of a would-be rescuer shouting to a drowning flood victim to grab hold of the rope they have thrown them. Jesus sees pain, as Lewis did, as a means by which humans can be brought back to a right state of faith in God. Pain exists in this world because the world has fallen from the pain-free, perfect state that it was meant to be. Sin exists because we allow it to. But God uses that pain to draw our eyes away from our brokenness to look to his grace, mercy, and love.

Here in November as you reflect on all the things you are thankful for, take a moment and give thanks, not for the pain of life, but for the grace of God that uses that pain to lift us up to new life.

December 1923.... the beginning of the creation of the Church Office.

In December 1923, When Rev. Tome began his pastorate here, two items seem to lead to the beginnings of the "Church Office". They were, first, about providing office supplies for the Pastor, and second, he asked about the advisability of getting a secretary for the church. These items were discussed, which led to the use of the front room on the north side of the parsonage called a "Work Room". It was decided that rugs and a table were needed, along with the multigraph and hand-operated address-o-graph which were already owned by the congregation. A typewriter was soon added.

Mrs. Lester Stephan was secured by the committee to be the first Church Secretary in the "Work Room", giving what we now call part-time work, serving till the spring of 1925. She was the Financial Secretary of the congregation, handling all incoming offerings of the Church, multi-graphing the Church Yearbook, multi-graphing the reports of all Wittenberg pledges and receipts, and was stenographer for the pastor. It seems that for this work she was paid about \$.40 per hour.

In January 1967, we gained possession of the former Nazarene Church building and after remodeling, the office staff moved into their new quarters in the fall of 1972.

The secretaries who have served our congregation were: Mrs. Mary Stephan, Miss Etta Bistline, Miss Artie Smith, Mrs. Rachel Morse, Miss Alma Rambo, Miss Josephine Snyder, Mrs. Ruth Steele, Miss Louise Wiest, Mrs. Ruby Crum, Mrs. Leota Boyce, Mrs. Eloise Swank, Mrs. Jane Barton, Mrs. Margaet Laws, Mrs. Mary Adams, Mrs. Carolyn Bricker, Mrs. Linda Uts, Mrs. Pamela Frank, Mrs. Mary Platt, Mrs. Lana Van Vlerah, Mrs. Suzanne Vogel, and Ms. Starr Stacklin.

Fast-forward to 2024...

A lot has happened in the church office building since moving in, in 1972. Council meetings, committee meetings, a variety of other gatherings and folks just stopping by. Along with the offices for staff, we have our Scout Troop 406 in the basement and have made space for Brian Crum CPA LLC Accounting and Taxation Services. Our Bus Kids have been given an area in the conference room to hang out.

The office secretary has changed, too. No longer do we have paid full-time employees. Now we have volunteers that keep the office open on a daily basis to serve our church members and the public. I am grateful and blessed to have such wonderful ladies to work with: Shirley Huskey, Pam Blankenhorn, Nancy Medley and I are here weekly. When we need extra help, we have backup volunteers that are very gracious with their time. We keep the office open Monday through Friday, 9:00am to Noon.

The building itself is showing the signs of time. Upgrading has begun "slowly". Within the past couple of months, the two front offices have received paint and new carpet. Brian, through his business hired his office painted and they helped Dan with the painting of the front offices. Brian paid for the carpet in the halls and Finance office. A big thank you to them! Thank you to the Property Committee for helping fund the front offices carpet. Thank you to the Endowment Committee for funding the new blinds. A big thank you to Judy Hoover for paying to have the windows washed in the conference room. Nothing lasts forever as the curtains fell apart in the washing machine. Dan rebuilt all the conference room chairs, but the wood is so rotten, the screws fell out. So, yes, we are in need of new conference room chairs and window treatments.

It's a start! While the whole building needs attention, the next projects will be giving the lobby a face lift...drywall, paint, and flooring; the two bathrooms will become one unisex handicap bathroom needing a wall removed, handicap railings and flooring. While the remaining areas need flooring and painting, (Pastor Rus' office and the conference room), a handicap ramp is much needed to be built at the side entrance. As our building has aged, sadly, so has our congregation. In time, as the Property Committee secures funds and through donations, it is hoped that these upgrades can be completed.
